







In *Hippocrasy*, rheumatologist and epidemiologist Rachelle Buchbinder and orthopaedic surgeon Ian Harris argue that the benefits of medical treatments are often wildly overstated and the harms understated. 

There is a Turkish saying that one's home is not where one is born, but where one grows full – doğduğun yer, doyduğun yer.

Mixing the personal and political, Eda Gunaydin's bold and innovative writing explores race, class, gender and violence, and Turkish diaspora – both in Australia and round the world – in her compelling debut.

Equal parts piercing, tender and funny, this book takes us from an overworked and underpaid café job in Western Sydney, the mother-daughter tradition of sharing a meal in the local kebab shop, a night clubbing with Turkish students, to the legacies of family migration, and intergenerational trauma within a history of violence and political activism.

For readers of Ta-Nehisi Coates and Durga Chew-Bose, Eda Gunaydin seeks to unsettle neat descriptions of migration and diaspora. How should we address a racist remark on the 2AM night ride bus? What does the Turkish diaspora of Auburn in Western Sydney have in common with Neukölln in Berlin? And how can we look to past suffering to imagine a new future?

EDA GUNAYDIN is a Turkish-Australian writer. She writes bilingually, in English and Turkish. She has obtained numerous shortlistings, awards and fellowships, including the 2018-2019 Dinny O'Hearn fellow at the University of Melbourne. She has spoken at numerous writer's festivals including Sydney Writers' Festival, and has published in The Lifted Brow, Overland, Voiceworks, Sydney Review of Books, Meanjin, and more. She is currently completing a PhD in International Relations at the University of Sydney.





Australia's deep past and its modern history are intrinsically linked to the Pacific.

In Australia & the Pacific, Ian Hoskins — award-winning author of Sydney Harbour and Coast — expands his gaze to examine Australia's relationship with the Pacific region; from our ties with Papua New Guinea and New Zealand to our complex connections with China, Japan and the United States. This revealing, sweeping narrative history begins with the shifting of the continents to the coming of the first Australians and, thousands of years later, the Europeans who dispossessed them. Hoskins explores colonists' attempts to exploit the riches of the region while keeping 'white Australia' separate from neighbouring Asians, Melanesians and Polynesians. He examines how the advent of modern human rights and the creation of the United Nations after World War Two changed Australia and investigates our increasing regional engagement following the rise of China and the growing unpredictability of US foreign policy. Concluding with the offshore detention of asylum seekers and current debates over climate change, Hoskins questions Australia's responsibilities towards our increasingly imperilled neighbours.

IAN HOSKINS has worked as an academic and public historian in Sydney for 30 years. Everything that makes us human – from our brains and bodies to our values and ways of life – is about to be transformed or superseded. Whether we embrace it or not.

The world is changing in rapid and disruptive ways — radical life extension, the merging of human and machine intelligence, sexbots and the post-work economy await. But we've got ape brains in a modern world, with tribal instincts and short-term thinking getting in the way of democracy, diplomacy and effective action on major issues like the climate emergency. And our Palaeolithic brains are making us miserable in our daily lives with rising rates of depression and anxiety.

In *Future Superhuman* Elise Bohan, an exciting new voice in transhumanism, argues that we should actively aspire to leave humanity behind and become superhuman, embracing medical breakthroughs that will mean we might not have to die for a really long time. Co-evolve with AI to be radically smarter, freed from 'the constraints of our own biological meatsacks' and with memories enhanced by supercomputers. We might even become our own progeny.

ELISE BOHAN completed a PhD in Modern History at Macquarie University in November 2018. In the past few years she has been a contributor to the popular digital publication Big Think and The Griffith Review. She has published several book chapters on Big History and transhumanism and wrote the introduction to the popular Dorling Kindersley book Big History (2016). Elise has written and presented video lectures on artificial intelligence for Macquarie University's Big History Institute and is regularly invited to present at academic conferences and public events, including the Australian Academy of the Humanities Annual Symposium and the Writing NSW Speculative Fiction Festival.






EDITH BLAKE'S WAR: THE ONLY AUSTRALIAN NURSE KILLED IN ACTION DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR

In the early hours of 26 February 1918, the British hospital ship *Glenart Castle* steamed into the Bristol Channel, heading for France to pick up wounded men from the killing fields of the Western Front. On board was 32-year-old Australian nurse, Edith Blake. Unbeknown to the ship's company, a German U-boat lurked in the waters below.

When Edith Blake missed out on joining the Australian Army, she was one of 130 Australian nurses allotted to the British Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service in early 1915. Her first posting was in Cairo where she nursed soldiers wounded at Gallipoli. In Edith's remarkable letters to her family back home, she shares her homesickness and frustration with military rules, along with the savagery of the injuries she witnessed in the operating theatre. Later, at Belmont War Hospital in Surrey, she writes of her conflicted feelings about nursing German prisoners of war even as battles on the Western Front raged and German aircraft bombed England.

In Edith Blake's War, her great niece, Krista Vane-Tempest, traces Edith's gripping story, from training in Sydney to her war service in the Middle East, England and the Mediterranean, and her tragic death in waters where Germany had promised the safe passage of hospital ships.

The rise of podcasts has been exponential. An audio format that was largely unknown until recently now fills the lives of millions of listeners who can get on with other things at the same time. Podcasts have become an essential part of popular culture, and a new way to absorb information that once might have been read in newspapers, books, magazines or part of current affairs radio. Indeed, many media platforms also have their own accompanying podcasts and radio has remade itself by becoming 'podcastable'.

In this original book, Siobhàn McHugh — an award-winning podcast creator and teacher — dissects what makes a good podcast and outlines how it is done. How do you tell a complicated and compelling story through sound? How can journalists and newspapers use podcasts? How can organisations big and small use podcasting to get their message out? DR SIOBHÁN MCHUGH is an award-winning writer, documentary-maker, academic and podcast producer who has been telling audio stories for four decades. She has won six gold awards at New York Festivals for co-produced podcasts including Phoebe's Fall, Wrong Skin and The Last Voyage of the Pong Su, and is consulting producer on The Greatest Menace, a queer true-crime podcast. Siobhàn has published four books of social history, including The Snowy: A History (2019), the first edition of which won the Douglas Stewart Prize for Non-Fiction at the NSW Premier's Literary Awards. She is Honorary Associate Professor in Media and Communications at the University of Sydney, Australia, and Honorary Associate Professor in Journalism at the University of Wollongong, Australia.






GLASS: THE LIFE AND ART OF KLAUS MOJE

For more than fifty years, Klaus Moje devoted his life to the art of glass. He called it the 'most seductive' medium, and in his hands it had the power to delight and amaze collectors around the world. His lifetime's work changed the practice and appreciation of contemporary glass.

Moje's philosophy of 'working into the hopeful' and his passion for the colour and geometry he saw in the natural world shone through his kilnformed glass works, a technique he pioneered.

Moje was both artist and educator. After an apprenticeship in his father's small glass-cutting and glass-grinding business and a masters degree at the Glasfachschule Hadamar, Moje established his Hamburg studio. In 1982, he moved to Australia to set up the Glass Workshop at the Canberra School of Art, one of the most successful glass education programs in the world. Following 10 years teaching, Moje returned to full-time studio work. His life and art inspired many who chose to work with this medium.

In *Glass: The life and art of Klaus Moje*, art historian Nola Anderson celebrates the creativity and artistic spirit of this remarkable artist.





NOLA NADERSON has extensive experience in museums and art history. She has a degree in Fine Arts from Sydney University and has published widely in art journals and anthologies. Her work has been recognised through research grants and awards, including a Smithsonian Institution International Fellowship in Museum Studies in Washington DC. She has held significant positions within the cultural sector: she was Head of National Collections at the Australian War Memorial and, more recently, Chair of the Canberra Glassworks. She is the author of Australian War Memorial: Treasures from a century of collecting, the Australian War Memorial's first major survey publication of its collection of over four million items. Passionate about contemporary glass, Anderson has written widely on the topic, specialising in the history of its development in Australia since the early 1970s and the artists who have made it such a vibrant art form.

No matter where you look in Australia, you're more than likely to see a eucalyptus tree. Scrawny or majestic, smooth as pearl or rough as a pub brawl, they have defined a continent for thousands of years, and they continue to shape our imagination.

First Nations' Australians have long known the abilities of the eucalyptus. And as part of the raft of changes wrought by the arrival of colonial Australia, botanists have battled in a race to count, classify and own the species – a battle that has lasted more than two hundred years.



Bright Lights is a multi-biography of film giants in Australia and America across the ages.

Australia has a long film history — in fact the world's first feature film — *The Story of the Kelly Gang* — was made in Melbourne and released in 1906, running at a lean but landmark 60–70 minutes. Today, much of Australia's film talent goes to the US, as individuals go looking for bigger and more lucrative opportunities overseas.

Errol Flynn, Peter Finch, David Gulpilil, and Nicole Kidman are the outsized personalities that form this book, and overcame geographical and cultural obstacles to star in some of the biggest films of their eras – among them *The Adventures of Robin Hood, Network, Walkabout, Crocodile Dundee*, and, for all intents and purposes, the entirety of Nicole Kidman's filmography.

From the Golden Age of Hollywood in the 1930s until the streaming wars of today, the biographical detail of each of these figures tells a story about both Australia and America, and the larger story of the cultural exportation that transformed both countries and their cinemas.
